News from the Belfry

June and July were busy months in the belfry, as we entertained visitors from Kent and the ringers from the Abbey, who were prevented from practising because of the International Organ Festival. On 8 July members of the Cambridge University Guild rang a peal of 5040 Cambridge Surprise Minor in two hours and forty minutes to mark the golden wedding of Christine and Vivian Nutton. The ringers were 1 Vivian Nutton; 2 Alan Winter; 3 Christopher Rogers; 4 Catriona Agg; 5 Jonathan Agg (conductor); 6 Brian Meads. The ringers of 2 and 3 also rang at the Nuttons' wedding in 1973.

Equally praiseworthy was a quarter peal of 1260 Plain Bob Doubles rung on 24 July by local students: 1 Lucy Pether; 2 Lucas Williams; 3 Hana Booth; 4 Thomas Groves; 5 Callum Hayes (conductor); 6 Louisa Haynes. The ringers of 2 and 5 learned to ring at Sandridge, while I helped to train the ringers of 1 and 4 at St Stephen's. It's been very many years since local young ringers managed to ring a quarter peal, so Sandridge has played its part in training for the future. *Vivian Nutton*

W.I. Reports

At our **July meeting** John McCombe gave us a very illuminating talk, illustrated with slides, on the work of SERV (Service by Emergency) Herts and Beds. This is a nationwide service which began in South London in the 1960s and now provides an out of hours service to the NHS, delivering blood, frozen breastmilk, patient samples, organs for transplant and drugs to six hospitals and three hospices across the two counties.

Altogether it has 140 male and female volunteers who largely use their own vehicles and supply their own fuel, and they mostly operate at night.

There are also night-time handovers to neighbouring counties, which enables vital items to reach as far as Bristol. John told us that things have improved greatly since the early days, with more efficient equipment and improved cool boxes. This helps them in their aim of delivering blood, platelets and other medical supplies from one establishment to another as quickly as possible without sacrifice of safety.

John got involved when his son was unable to join as, being too young, he said "They won't take me Dad, but you could do it!" The group was very honoured to receive the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service in the Platinum Jubilee Honours List – this is the equivalent of a group MBE.

It has been a busy summer in our church-

yards, especially given the rapid growth of grass and other plants due to the warm, wet weather.

Churchyard News

Five smart new noticeboards have been installed. They will be updated regularly with news of church events and services. Three also carry a shortened version of the Churchyard Regulations: the full version is available in the church porch or online: https://www.stalbansdiocese.org/directory/ diocesan-registry/

Our regular volunteer gardeners have kept the Garden of Rest looking beautiful, including the addition of some new plants, and our professional gardener has been looking after the beds outside the church, as well as working in the House Lane Churchyard. This has included the levelling off of some graves and clearing the weeds in the shady part of the churchyard. In addition, another gardener has been mowing a significant portion of the churchyard.

We have funding for a raised bed outside the Church and this should appear in the next couple of months. It will be planted with sensory plants, including herbs. We continue to observe wildlife and unusual plant species. Animals seen include badgers, foxes, bats, newts and a slowworm – as well as parakeets! Rarer plant species spotted include sorrel.



The hedges have been trimmed – one rather more enthusiastically than expected, but hopefully it will grow back. Clearance of the rough area has begun and we are hoping Community Payback will return to finish the job. We know this is a problem area but there are no burials in this part of the churchyard and generally resources are given to the areas where the graves are. If anyone can come up with a long-term practical solution, we'd love to hear from you.

Churchyard News (continued)

The House Lane Churchyard is particularly difficult to maintain due to the uneven nature of the ground, the clay soil and the large number of loose items that are still appearing on some graves. We are very grateful that we have not had to remove many unauthorised items recently – thank you to families for understanding that plastic or breakable items (indeed, any loose items) are not permitted. If there are items on a grave that are precious to you, please take them home and keep them there in safety.

If you have a family member buried at House Lane, do please contact us for advice before putting anything permanent on a grave. For example, edging, bark and/or stones make mowing very difficult and so are not allowed under the Regulations (this does not apply to much older graves where stone edging used to be permitted).

We would welcome the chance to help any family who would like an older grave levelled and grassed – we are trying to do this with newer plots as the soil settles.

We are always happy to be offered help with maintaining our churchyards. And, as ever, if you have any questions or need any advice please do get in touch. *Revd Wendy*

PARISH COUNCIL SUPPLEMENT

AT THE MEETING OF SANDRIDGE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON 12 JULY 2023, THE FOLLOWING POINTS WERE RAISED:

There were apologies received and accepted from Councillor Julie Oakley.

Disclosures of Interest

There was none.

Minutes

The minutes of the meeting of the Council held on 14 June 2023 were reviewed. They were agreed to be a correct record and it was unanimously resolved that the minutes of the meeting be approved and signed by the Chair.

Questions to Officers

There was none.

Public Participation – an opportunity for residents to raise issues or ask questions of Members

There was none.

CLERK'S REPORTS

Monthly Accounts

Members reviewed a schedule of creditor payments for the period 15 June 2023 to 12 July 2023. It was unanimously resolved to approve the payment of this schedule on 14 July 2023.

Terms of Reference – committee amendments for ratification by Full Council

The Council was asked to ratify the amendments below as agreed by the various committees;

- Finance Committee: Annual election of a Vice Chair.
- Jersey Farm Woodland Park Committee: Increase membership from five to six Parish Councillors.

• **Planning Committee**: The Committee to consist of eight members drawn from across the parish. The Chair to seek agreement from the members of the committee to cancel a planned meeting. Where the planning authority's rules permit, and in accordance with those rules, the committee to initiate or support the call in of an application on behalf of Sandridge Parish Council.

It was resolved to formally adopt all the above amendments to the terms of reference.

Matters of Note

- Cllr Twidell has received instruction in loading, unloading and operating the new Kubota tractor and has undertaken to carry out some of the footpath cuts on the Woodland Park in future.
- The Parish Council hosted the St Albans District Association of Local Councils (SADALC) meeting on 3 July.
- The Sports and Recreation Committee is looking to recruit 'Park Rangers', ready to commit to weekly, monthly or biannual tasks at a preferred location in support of the committee and to assist those interested in achieving their Duke of Edinburgh award. Cllr Twidell gave Members a verbal update on the initiative and it was well received. It is hoped by the committee that more involvement from local people will lead to a greater sense of stewardship in future.

COUNCILLOR AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Grant Applications

Members considered an application from the Hornbeam Wood Hedgehog Sanctuary. Following discussion it was resolved to provide a grant of £500 to Hornbeam Wood Hedgehog Sanctuary as a contribution towards educational leaflets and cards.

Skate Ramp

A verbal report was given by Cllr Twidell on an initiative to involve local young people in an exciting art project on the Jersey Farm Open Space with street artist Ant Steel. This is part of a wider project by the Sports and Recreation Committee to engage with all residents using or living close to recreational spaces. Members were provided with examples of Ant's work elsewhere in the city. It was suggested at the meeting to post the event on Facebook to make local residents aware of the initiative.

Cycle Parking in the Parish

Cilr Wells provided a report to the Council ahead of the meeting with a proposal to improve cycle parking and to encourage bike use in the parish. He presented his arguments for the benefits of providing cycle parking within the parish to Members. Following discussion, it was unanimously resolved to install a set of bike stands in the vicinity of the Community Garden to the value of £1,000. Councillors agreed to fund the installation from reserves.

Sale of Land Adjacent to Jersey Farm Woodland Park

Councillors discussed the sale of land adjacent to Jersey Farm Woodland Park. Information was shared to Members ahead of the meeting by Cllr Ternouth, with information from HCC on access and rights of way. Due to the timing and urgency of action, it was proposed by Cllr Twidell and seconded by Cllr Roberts to seek to purchase the land and a sum of £80,000 was agreed for this purpose to include costs. It was resolved that an Officer of the Council should enter into discussion with Savills regarding the purchase of the land.

Post meeting note: the Parish Council was unsuccessful in securing a purchase.

SADALC and HAPTC

A verbal report was given by Cllr Hale on recent meetings of the St Albans and District Association of Local Councils and the Hertfordshire Association of Parish and Town Councils.
