## Sandridge Lychgate receives a funding boost from Grants for War Memorials scheme

This press release was issued by Jenny Dundon on 20 July 2024 to the local press at the culmination of the restoration project.

Sandridge Lychgate War Memorial has benefited from a grant of £5,450 from War Memorials Trust, supported by Historic England.

The money has enabled repair and conservation of the wooden honour boards that are a record of gratitude to the men of the parish who returned from the Great War, and the repair and conservation of the metal plaques which commemorate those who died in both World Wars. Also the repair of the brick plinth of the Lychgate, and treatment of the ancient timbers and repairs to its roof.

Those involved in the project were St Leonard's Church and Sandridge Parish Council. Donations were received from the Parish Council, Councillor Annie Brewster and local people, as well as St Leonard's church. Thank you to all those who have donated.

Francis Morton, Director of War Memorials Trust said: "War memorials remind us of all the millions of lives ended or impacted by conflict. Preserving them not only ensures we continue to commemorate them, but also shows future generations the consequences of war and encourages them to avoid such suffering. War Memorials Trust was delighted to award this project a grant.

The charity hopes the work will ensure its future as a focal point for commemoration. Anyone concerned about any other war memorials that might need help should contact the charity, or if you believe it is important to preserve our war memorial heritage, then please make a donation to help us protect them."

A rededication of the War Memorial will be held during the October Flower Festival.

#### NOTES FROM THE BELL TOWER

#### Ringing the bells of London

Last month (July) I had the amazing opportunity to attend the Ringing World National Youth Contest in London, representing Young@Herts. We had an incredible day ringing in many London towers before finally going to the awards ceremony at St. Paul's Cathedral. Our team rang call changes at a church called St. Olave's, which is a beautiful small church with eight bells. After the contest, we had a great day of ringing throughout the City of London and I got to know places I had never seen before.

The first church we went to is called St. Magnus, which is a very special church with 12 bells. It is hidden behind London Bridge, so it took some time to find it. That was the first time I rang on 12 bells, which was a bit challenging at first, but also great fun. The rest of the day we rang at many amazing churches. We went to St. James Bermondsey, St. Mary's Rotherhithe and Spitalfields Church, each with its own charms and great sounding bells of course.

Our last church was St Mary le Bow, whose 12 bells are the most famous ones in the country. We climbed the stairs up to the belfry which was full of bellringers; there must have been about 50 of us. We had to take turns and pick a bell fast, because everyone was eager to ring, especially the heaviest bells. I rang the tenth, which was - at about a ton - a lot heavier than I expected, but eventually with some help I managed to ring it. It was great fun and an unforgettable experience.

At the end of the day we went to St. Paul's Cathedral. A picture of all the teams was taken on the steps and then we went inside for the awards ceremony. The trophies were handed out (our team came fourth in the country) and each of the more than 300 young ringers who participated received a medal. After we went outside, we heard the sound of the bells of St. Paul's Cathedral and this extraordinary day came to an end.

#### W I Reports

At our **July meeting**, we had a very enjoyable and sociable bring and share tea at Janet Churchard's house, with plentiful sandwiches, cakes, scones and sausage rolls. The weather was not kind, but we were able to admire Janet's garden, which includes climbers and lovely wooden structures as well as water features, through the windows.

In acknowledgement of the upcoming Paris Olympics, our President Jenny Roberts had prepared some Olympic-themed table-top games with French and Olympic colours, including high jump, long jump and a snail race.

At our **August meeting**, Tom Way gave us a fascinating talk, including some very striking images of his wonderful wildlife photographs. He explained that, having studied sport at university, he had had a complete change of career, setting up his own photography business. He now spends much of the year in Africa and also runs courses teaching people how to take photographs. He emphasised that photography can be dull and requires a great deal of patience; sometimes he needs seven days to get a good shot. On one occasion, to get a shot of a water vole in its den, he spent those seven days actually in a river.

He also spends time not only in Africa but taking photographs near his home in Buckinghamshire and in neighbouring counties. He has recently discovered the virtues of black and white photography which he turns into prints for sale. He showed us a very striking print of an elephant with extra long tusks, known as a super tusker: there are only 21 such elephants left in the world.

He photographs a variety of wildlife, including many species of bird, owls, hares, badgers and foxes. He explained that it was important to zoom out to show where the animal lives, and to try to capture them at eye level. Sadly, both the water vole and hedgehog are in decline in the UK and rarely seen.

He recounted anecdotes such as capturing the only buzzard in Buckinghamshire with missing tail feathers, and the extreme rarity of kingfishers, whom many people have never seen, having noticed only a flash of blue over water. He also told us about his triumph at having captured a red squirrel leaping towards him in full flight.

## PARISH COUNCIL SUPPLEMENT (ABRIDGED DRAFT MINUTES)

## AT THE MEETING OF SANDRIDGE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON 10 JULY 2024, THE FOLLOWING ITEMS WERE DISCUSSED:

## **TO RECEIVE AND FORMALLY ACCEPT APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE** Apologies were received and accepted from Councillors Wells, Chachulski and Lambert.

#### **DISCLOSURES OF INTEREST**

There was none.

### TO APPROVE THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 12 JUNE 2024

The minutes were duly approved.

#### **Questions to Officers**

There was none.

#### **Public Participation**

There was none.

#### **CLERK'S REPORTS**

#### **Monthly Accounts**

Members reviewed a schedule of creditor payments for the period 13 June to 10 July 2024. It was unanimously resolved to approve the schedule of creditors for this month.

There is no scheduled Council meeting in August. It was unanimously resolved to approve the creditor schedule being sent electronically to Councillors in August before being ratified at the September meeting.

#### **Installation of Mixed Recycling Bins**

As previously reported to the Council at the November meeting, the Clerk has been pursuing the installation of two dual recycling bins in each of Spencer Meadow and Sherwood Park Parish open spaces. All waste from our open spaces currently goes to landfill. The model agreed in principle is as follows:

 The Parish Council buys and installs two dual bins, one at each of the two sites.

- John O'Conner Ltd empty the bins daily, taking the recyclables to the local Veolia depot.
- The approximate cost of each dual bin, including installation, is £800.
- The annual cost of collection from each dual bin is £1,179. It may
  be possible to offset the cost of collection from an existing general
  waste bin (£214), dependent on precise location.

Members were asked to note that the Committee for Sustainability has approved funding for the initiative as follows:

- The purchase and installation of two new bins from a combination of John O'Conner new items (£400), Street Scene Initiatives (£500) and Sustainability Projects budgets (£700).
- The funding of the collection of the bins for the last quarter of 2024/25 in the total sum of £589 from the John O'Conner new items budget, with a new budget item in 2025/26 of £2,356, subject to approval from Full Council at the November/December meeting. The Committee for Sustainability may use earmarked income from the clothing banks to fund future bin collections and this will be proposed at the next meeting of that committee.

The Clerk confirmed that the bins would not be purchased until the on-going funding requirements were confirmed upon approval of the 2025-26 budget in the autumn.

## Installation of Hot and Cold Water Dispensers in Marshalswick Committee Room

The Centres Manager provided a report and proposal for the installation of hot and cold water dispensers and a mini-fridge in the Committee Room at Marshalswick Community Centre. All drinking cups available for hirers' use will be fully recyclable. It was unanimously resolved to purchase and install both water dispensers and a mini-fridge. Funds will also be provided to upgrade the electricity point to supply the necessary power from a convenient location within the room. Total costs are estimated at £900-£1,000.

#### Sports and Recreation Expenditure 2024/25

At Full Council on 10 April it was agreed that, in addition to the 2024/25 budget, the committee would have access to the funding remaining in reserves following the cancellation of the pump track. This was approved on the understanding that the committee would report to Full Council what works/installations were being carried out. Details of works approved at the Sports and Recreation Committee held on 28 June are as follows;

- Spider Climber and replacement football wall at Sherwood Park Open Space
- Removal of horse apparatus and installation of inclusive group seesaw at William Bell Open Space
- Expansion of wetpour surfacing at Harness Way Open Space
- Replacement timbers on the slide in St Leonards Open Space
- Replacement hanging loop and deteriorated timbers in Jersey Farm Adventure Playground
- Replacement swing seats in Damson Way and St Leonards Open Spaces

The Committee also agreed to allow a further 10% (£4,800) of the above total spend to further maintenance works, following recommendations from the Play Inspection Company in their annual reports. It was unanimously resolved to note these works.

#### COUNCILLOR AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

#### **Grant Applications**

An application was received from Community First Responders, East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust. Following discussion, it was proposed by Cllr Sieger and seconded by Cllr Chalkley that the grant is awarded to the full amount requested but that further information is provided on the relationship between the First Responders Group and the East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust in due course. It was resolved to award £1,200 to St Albans Community First Responder Group.

#### **Temporary Closure of B651 St Albans Road**

Members received a report from Cllr Hale updating on the planned closure of the B651 following a meeting with Herts County Council (HCC) officers and a representative of the company that is working with the utilities on the management of the proposed road works. The works are planned for 6 - 27 August, with a commitment from the utilities company to work from 07.00 to 19.00 Monday to Saturday and 09.00 to 16.00 on Sunday. Following a recommendation from Cllr Hale it was unanimously resolved that Sandridge Parish Council noted the report and will assist in publicising the closure and encourage local residents to support the impacted businesses during the closure.

## Notice of Appeal from Brett Aggregates – quarry at former Hatfield Aerodrome

Members received a report from Cllr Hale on the appeal from Brett Aggregates, following refusal of planning permission from Herts County Council for excavations at the former Hatfield Aerodrome site. Following a recommendation from Cllr Hale, seconded by Cllr Ternouth, it was unanimously resolved that Sandridge Parish Council reiterate its objection to the quarry and delegate to the Sandridge Parish Council Planning

Committee and the Clerk the authority to submit an objection to the Planning Inspectorate.

Herts Association of Parish and Town Councils (HAPTC) Executive Cllr Hale provided an update to Members on the recent meeting of the HAPTC Executive, which included a presentation on the Local Nature Recovery Strategy.

#### **Structural Survey of Marshalswick Community Centre**

Following discussions at the last meeting, Cllr Leonard provided Members with an estimate of the cost to undertake a comprehensive structural survey of Marshalswick Community Centre which is not likely to exceed £7,500. This is believed to be a useful pre-requisite to budgetary discussion in the autumn on whether to set aside an annual sum for the future development of the Community Centre building. Two further quotations for a survey of like-kind will be sought. Following a proposal from Cllr Leonard, seconded by Cllr Sieger, it was unanimously resolved to approve an amount of up to £7,500 within this financial year.

## Report on Proposed Application to Modify the Herts County Definitive Map

Cllr Ternouth provided a written report on the proposed application on behalf of Sandridge Parish Council to modify the Definitive Map to accommodate the route used by residents near to Highfield Road. Both the Committee for Sustainability and the Jersey Farm Woodland Park Management Committee have already considered the issue and agreed the application should be made. Following a proposal by Cllr Ternouth, seconded by Cllr Reid, it was unanimously resolved that the Parish Council makes an application to Herts County Council to modify the Definitive Map in respect of a well-used local walking/cycling route between Bridleway 53 and St Helier Road (Footpath 27) with the aim of making this route a Public Right of Way.

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
