2025 St Leonard's Church Stewardship campaign



On Sunday 27 April St Leonard's launched its stewardship campaign. Regular readers will know that last year the church ran at a deficit. An article in the April magazine explained our financial position in some detail. Running at a deficit is obviously not sustainable. Our outgoings are modest and largely fixed, so the only option is to increase our income.

The church is much loved and used by many people in our community, and from elsewhere too. It is entirely supported by donations. If we want the church to be looked after, open and led by a minister, then we need to help towards its upkeep. This is about £1,500 a week, without us paying for any more substantial maintenance tasks.

We need to increase our income by at least £5,000 a year. We also need to be braver about asking people to leave us money in their wills so that the building can be maintained in the future.

How can we do this?

If you already give regularly to St Leonard's by any means, you will be asked to consider giving using the Parish Giving Scheme. This scheme allows us to move towards a more sustainable financial future by giving us a more regular cash flow and simplifying the way we reclaim any Gift Aid. We are also hoping that regular donors will think about increasing their monthly giving.


Then we need new people to join the Parish Giving Scheme. Giving packs are available in church or you can fill in the contact form on the website and we will get one to you. If you, our regular readers, each gave us just £5 a month, then we would not only wipe out our deficit but have some money to pay for some things we just can't afford at the moment. A photocopier is on the wish list.

The packs also contain a leaflet called A Lasting Gift to St Leonard's and this is to help you consider leaving the church some money in your will. The leaflet offers advice on how to do this. In the past couple of years, legacy money has paid for the sound system and the redecoration of the chancel. Future projects, such as the installation of new heating, will also be paid for - at least in part - by money left to the church.

If you love St Leonard's, if you'd like it to be there for your family in the future, if you are hoping your ashes will lie in the Garden of Rest, if the building brings you joy or comfort, if you value our heritage, if you enjoy the community events we offer or our worship, then please think about how you can contribute. The campaign runs until 14 June and I very much hope that I can report back soon after that on how successful the campaign has been.

St Leonard's church acts to help save endangered swifts

Swifts are fast-flying, spectacular birds and St Leonard's church has teamed up with a local bird group to install four swift nest boxes in the belfry to help conserve them.

Swifts only spend a few weeks in the UK, as they come here from Africa to breed. They rarely land and fly continuously through day and night. They eat, sleep and mate on the wing and, in its lifetime, an individual swift can fly as many as four million miles.

Sadly, in the UK, numbers have declined by about half in the last twenty years and they are now red-listed for conservation concern. They nest in towns and cities, in small gaps in roofs and eaves, but modern building methods are gradually excluding swifts from these spaces. Fortunately, swifts take readily to hollow bricks called swift bricks and swift nest boxes, which are being installed to try and help reverse the decline.

We are extremely grateful to St Leonard's church for agreeing to install the nest boxes and hope local residents will enjoy seeing swifts and help in monitoring the boxes for occupancy. Swifts are relatively clean birds and usually take any mess out to open countryside and should not cause a nuisance.

Thanks to Anne Thomas for instigating the project, Maurice Wells for the magnificent carpentry involved in building the swift boxes and all at St Leonard's church for supporting the installation, which was approved by the PCC and Diocese of St Albans.

This change of date gives our flower arrangers a chance to use different



W I report

On Tuesday 28 April we had a very interesting talk from Dr Aruna Mene: *From Rags to Riches*. She explained that she tries to act sustainably by creating upcycled artwork from her treasured pieces of fabric. We were shocked to hear that over 200 tonnes of textiles go to landfill every year and that even natural fibres release toxic gases.

She showed us some beautiful examples of her artwork, which included the multi-coloured domes of St Basil's in Moscow and even copies of Klimt's paintings. These are all created as collages using a iron on canvas. She has made some exciting trips all over the world, including a hot air balloon trip over Cappadocia and a visit to Patagonia. She has also visited Ghana, where a huge problem created by the second-hand market in European clothes has led to massive quantities of garments being washed up on the shoreline. It takes 1,700 litres of water to manufacture a T-shirt or pair of jeans and fast fashion adds to the problems.

She also makes collages, featuring landscapes, and calendars, using herbs from her garden and banyan trees. She also showed us upcycled mats created from the scraps of cloth and old clothes she uses, baskets made of rope, and bookmarks.

Her works are further embellished using machine embroidery. A St Albans connection was established by her reference to the cats of Louis Wain, the artist who was confined to Napsbury mental asylum and painted fascinating portraits of cats. All in all, a very inspiring and uplifting talk.

Our next meeting on 14 May will be our AGM, with presentations on the Resolutions to be submitted to the National AGM in Cardiff.

AT THE MEETING OF SANDRIDGE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON 9 APRIL 2025, THE FOLLOWING ITEMS WERE DISCUSSED:

Apologies were received and accepted from Councillors James Lambert, Adam Twidell, Julie Oakley, Debbie Chachulski

DISCLOSURES OF INTEREST

There was none.

TO APPROVE THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 12 MARCH 2025

The minutes were duly approved.

Questions to Officers

There was none.

Public Participation

Deferred to the later item concerning allotments.

CLERK'S REPORTS

Monthly Accounts

Members reviewed a schedule of creditor payments for the period 13 March to 9 April 2025, having been previously circulated. It was unanimously resolved to approve payment of this schedule on 11 April 2025.

Woodcock Hill Allotments

Mr Mike Caddy spoke to Members, informing them that an Allotment Holders Association has now been formed at Woodcock Hill as part of the National Allotment Society, creating an upsurge in interest from other allotment holders. He confirmed that County Councillor Allison Wren had requested a meeting with the relevant officer at Herts County Council to determine current levels of expenditure at the site and also the willingness of the Council to hand management to the Parish Council. Cllr Chalkley expressed an interest in attending.

This matter to be progressed at a later meeting once the above has been established.

Local Policing

PCSO Chris Stokes attended the meeting to update Members on current policing issues within the parish. A number of topics were covered, following which Chris was thanked for his attendance.

Library of Things (Share St Albans)

A member of Share St Albans was unfortunately unavailable to attend the meeting but expects to come to the next Full Council meeting on 14 May.

A verbal Progress Report from the Community Centres Manager on the implementation of Reserved Parking Spaces for Marshalswick Community Centre Users

The Centres Manager confirmed that the five reserved spaces and signage are expected to be complete by the end of April. It is hoped this will allow users of the centre to park more readily.

Wildflowers in Sandridge Parish

The Clerk read a statement from the PACE Officer regarding this year's wildflower beds at Harness Way open space, St Leonard's open space, William Bell open space, St Leonard's churchyard and Sherwood Park. It's hoped to produce a colourful display of annuals to support wildlife this year.

Community Garden – The Ollie Foundation

Cllr Chalkley explained some of the constructive talks she's had with The Ollie Foundation CEO in respect of their involvement in the community garden. This includes volunteer days and Arts in the Garden events. The Foundation's involvement in the garden was seen as very positive.

Matters of Note

- John O'Conner Ltd has planted eight new trees on The Ridgeway, Barnfield Road and Highfield Road on behalf of the Parish Council.
- The Parish Office has had reinstatement valuations for the two community centres carried out. These have been forwarded to the Council's insurers to be applied to the existing policy but have not resulted in an increased premium this year.

- The Year-End Internal Audit will focus around the auditor attending the Parish Office on 28 April.
- The Sports and Recreation Committee have engaged with a new street artist to finish the skate ramp on the Jersey Farm Open Space. This will be a collaborative event, with the community encouraged to attend and join in. A poster is enclosed and Members are asked to encourage resident participation.
- Around 32 swift nesting boxes will have been installed within the parish by this meeting. The Committee for Sustainability will continue with the scheme in 2025/26 with many more residents expressing an interest.
- The Jersey Farm Community Centre will be decorated internally in August 2025.
- Work to repair the tarmac surfacing around Spencer Hall will take place on Thursday 3 April.
- Traffic calming works on the B651 have now been completed by Herts Highways.

COUNCILLOR AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Grant Applications

Holiday at Home (St Mary's): Members discussed this grant application before it was unanimously resolved to award the sum of £1,200 towards the Holiday at Home event.

VE-Day 80 Commemoration

Cllr Roberts updated Members on a VE Day event to be held at St Leonard's Church on 8 May, when a beacon will be lit. Cllr Ahmed informed the meeting that a street party will be held on Sherwood Avenue, Marshalswick.

A verbal update from Councillor Hale on the recent meeting with HCC Highway Team

County and Parish Councillor John Hale updated Members on issues relating to various addresses including Coopers Green Lane, Chalkdell Field, Oaklands Grange and Barnfield Road.

Red Eagle S6 Bus Service

Cllr Ternouth presented a report concerning issues with the S6 Red Eagle bus service. Following discussion, she undertook to draft for approval a letter to the County Council's Network Planners seeking a meeting.

East St Albans Development - Interim Report

Members reviewed a report from Cllr Ternouth regarding the next Taylor Wimpey development. It was noted that Planners may not always fully consider the Neighbourhood Plan when assessing large applications. Also noted was that, at the Parish Conference, Planners specifically asked Parish Councils to inform them of what infrastructure they would expect to be conditional for each large development.

Two things were agreed: firstly the recommendations in the report were agreed for action, with the proviso that the letters were to come from the Chair and the Clerk on behalf of the PC; secondly: it was agreed that a meeting be held at 2pm on 24 April at the Parish Council office for interested councillors to discuss a coordinated approach before attending the community engagement event at 3pm the same day.

(SPC has been invited to attend at 3pm, the general consultation event starts at 3.30pm).

Parish Summer Event Councillors briefly considered what event could be held this year. It was suggested that any ideas be brought to the next meeting.

An update on the St Albans Parish Conference held on 18 March Attendees of the annual Parish Conference gave their views on the event. Overall it was felt to be useful.

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

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
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
