Letter from our Vicar

Dear Friends

One of the joys of leaving the teaching profession is that I can take holidays whenever I like. So this letter is written in mid-September from Saltburn-by-the-Sea, on the north-east coast of England. Tomorrow we move on to Filey, which is near Scarborough and is where my husband Dale comes from originally.



I myself am definitely a Southerner! I was brought up in a village on the edge of Portsmouth Harbour. Out of our lounge window we could, on a fine day, see the Isle of Wight. Holidays were usually taken in Dorset, Devon or the New Forest. We seldom ventured 'north', apart from one visit to Sheffield for a family baptism. My parents were therefore horrified when I chose to go to university in Leeds. There was much knitting of warm jumpers and socks before I went off to the unknown frozen north. I spent three happy years in Leeds where I met Dale and we then settled in Hertfordshire where we have lived for 41 years, originally to suit Dale's job. But marrying Dale meant that the north of England became much more familiar; with regular trips to see extended family, holidays in the Lake District, and eventually all four of our children choosing a northern university to study at. My eldest daughter has lived in Yorkshire ever since

Many people view Christianity in the same way as I viewed 'the North' as a child. It's something far off and unfamiliar. It belongs to other people. And it might not welcome new folk. But I promise you that isn't the case.

Firstly, you don't have to move house, you can just visit. So no-one is expecting you to turn up and commit to follow Jesus in one visit. Although that does happen sometimes! Why not just pop in when the building is empty, or for one of our special events or services? If you prefer to be anonymous then the Cathedral is a great choice. Or you can join a streamed service or on-line church group.

Secondly, it's undoubtedly easier if you have some past experience of faith, however small, like my one visit to Sheffield. Many of us experienced Christianity as children through school assemblies. And yes, I still take those at our local school. But if you have poor memories of singing *Kumbaya* every day (or something much worse perhaps), then I promise you church has changed.

Letter from our Vicar (cont)

At St Leonard's we are pretty laid back and try to make our services as welcoming and non-threatening as possible. And there's no wrong way to do things. There's no kneeling, sermons are short, the music is varied and the coffee (like the welcome) is good.

And thirdly, the north of England is vast and so is the Christian faith. We'd planned to go to Northumbria this week, until we realised it would take longer to drive from York to Northumberland than from Sandridge to York! That means there is something for everyone in Christianity, indeed in the Church of England. Whether you think you might enjoy band-led worship, or the ancient words of the Book of Common Prayer. Whether you want Sunday or another day. Whether you want a small community or to be lost in a crowd - all can be found within half an hour's drive of our parish. You don't have to attend your local church, or even the same one each week. You don't have to physically attend at all if you have access to the internet. But if God is calling, if you feel something is missing in your life, then please do something about it.

I have come to love the North of England, just as I have come to love my faith. Eventually Dale and I plan to retire to York. For Dale, it will be going home. For me, it will be a new adventure. Coming to faith, or returning to faith, can be either or both of those things.

JERSEY FARM DAY CENTRE

Would you be interested in joining our team of volunteer helpers?

Jersey Farm Day Centre would love to hear from you if you think you may be interested in becoming a volunteer helper with us.

The Day Centre runs on Tuesdays during school term-time, 10.30am to 3.00pm at Jersey Farm Community Centre, providing companionship, activities and entertainment for senior citizens living in Jersey Farm, Sandridge and Marshalswick. We have up to 20 clients, the eldest of whom is 107! Some make their own way to the centre, whilst others are either brought by relatives or picked up by minibus from their homes. Most of our clients live alone and, for them, a day at the Centre is often the high spot of the week.

On arrival, tea/coffee and biscuits are served and the morning activities can include completing pencil and paper puzzles, reminiscing on topics of general interest and having a good chat, before a hot lunch is served at 12.30pm. The afternoon session begins at 1.45 pm and is given over to a wide variety of activities, including seated keep-fit, team quizzes, bingo and table games, and entertainment provided by visiting musical groups and soloists, choirs, school student musicians, and speakers on a range of fascinating topics. We round off the day with tea and biscuits before finishing at 3.00pm.

Our volunteer helpers undertake a variety of jobs, the most important of which is chatting with our clients and encouraging conversation. In between, they serve refreshments and lunch, clear away and wash up afterwards and join in with the afternoon activities and entertainment.

- * use anything breakable such as glass or pottery which can be a safety risk

Items not allowed under the Regulations can be removed.

This churchyard is covered by the Churchyard Regulations 2020 which are made pursuant to the provisions of section 77(1) of the Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction and Care of Churches Measure 2018. They came into effect on 1 August 2020. A full version is available online or in the church porch.

Graves in House Lane Churchyard: appeal for information

We recently commissioned a survey of the trees in House Lane churchyard to enable us to plan work more effectively - there are a surprising number of trees in that small area. We have asked the tree company to do some routine work on the yews to thin them out and keep them healthy.

There are four trees growing on graves which we shall be seeking permission from the Diocese to remove. These trees will be cut down to stumps and the stumps poisoned so as not to interfere with the graves any further. Both the trees and their roots can also damage nearby graves, not just the grave the tree is growing on. There is also a grave with a broken statue on it and this needs clearing.

The affected graves are:

Hazel Rosemary Armstrong – Buddleia Fanny French, d.1964 – Holly Caroline Callaghan, d.1961 – Holly David Clark, d.2007 – Juniper Charlie and Mary Towner, d.1988 and 2019 – broken items on grave

We would like to contact the families concerned, if we possibly can. However, we do not retain family details for funerals and burials for more than a short time, due to GDPR. Heritage Open Day - Saturday 20 September

Our first Heritage Day took place on Saturday 20 September, joining in with the national festival of Heritage Open Days from 12 to 21 September. We had no idea how many people would come to find out more about the living history of the church but we welcomed lots of visitors.

In the morning families came to join us for Craft Church. As well as activities involving stained glass windows, make a ringing bell tower or make a mouse, there was also brass rubbing and a trail to find images of animals in the fabric of the building. For younger visitors there were mice hidden around the church to find, some knitted, and some from the Vicar's collection of church mice!

Throughout the rest of the day people enjoyed:

- Reading the display boards made for the 900th anniversary, with information about both the church and the original parish
- Eating first class refreshments, sometimes while listening to our beautiful Victorian organ played by Dr John Winter.
 Quite a few people throughout the day also took the opportunity to try playing the organ – no musical ability required!
- A flower arranging demonstration by Perfect Moment Florists
- A talk on the history of the building by Prof Vivian Nutton
- A tour of the building and Lychgate with Cllr Jenny Roberts
- A chance to understand how the bells work, see them in action on a film clip and then ring the tolling bell

It was a busy and joyful day and we are hugely grateful to everyone who made it possible. We very much hope to offer something similar in



PARISH COUNCIL SUPPLEMENT (ABRIDGED DRAFT MINUTES)

AT A MEETING OF SANDRIDGE PARISH COUNCIL, HELD ON 10 SEPTEMBER 2025, THE FOLLOWING ITEMS WERE DISCUSSED:

TO RECEIVE AND FORMALLY ACCEPT APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies were received and accepted from Councillor Thomas

DISCLOSURES OF INTEREST AND DISPENSATIONS

Cllr Wells abstained from voting at the item regarding awarding a grant to St Albans Fixers, being a member of the applicant organisation.

TO APPROVE AS A CORRECT RECORD THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE COUNCIL HELD ON 9 JULY 2025 The minutes of the meeting were duly approved.

QUESTIONS TO OFFICERS

There was none.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

There was none.

CLERK'S REPORTS

Monthly Accounts

Members reviewed a schedule of creditor payments for the period 10 July to 13 August 2025. It was unanimously resolved to ratify the payment of this schedule made on 15 August 2025.

Members also reviewed a schedule of creditor payments for the period 14 August to 10 September 2025, having been previously circulated. It was unanimously resolved to approve payment of the online transfers on this schedule on 12 September 2025 and to ratify the payment of standing charges and debit card payments already made.

Sandridge Parish Council's Risk Management Policy

Members reviewed the Parish Council's Risk Management Policy. It was resolved that Sandridge Parish Council re-adopts the policy as circulated for review in September 2026.

Parish Council Logo/Rebrand

The Clerk presented a report regarding the existing Parish Council's crest and 'branding' as used on Parish Council letterheads, buildings, van and welcome signs etc. It was generally agreed that there is the capacity for misunderstanding the Council's role within the current design. Members were asked to send the Clerk their ideas for a fresher, more meaningful design. It was unanimously resolved to instruct the Parish Office to bring back to a future meeting some draft designs/straplines that would address the above and bring a fresh and modern look to the Council's crest. A budget of £500 within 2025/26 was also approved (if required).

Library of Things

Members reviewed a short written update on the Library of Things (Share St Albans) to whom storage is provided. The Council is happy to be assisting this worthwhile project.

Benches outside Jersey Farm Community Centre

Councillors considered a request by a member of the public for two benches in the vicinity of the Jersey Farm Community Centre. There was some doubt to there being sufficient space and Cllr Wells undertook to produce a scale site plan to bring to the October meeting for consideration.

Matters of Note

- The National Joint Council has approved a Pay Award for 2025/26 of 3.2% on all salary points. This award will be implemented in the August salary run, backdated to 1 April. A 3.5% increase had been budgeted for.
- 14 new fence panels have been installed without cost between the Parish Council's car park on The Ridgeway and the Food Hall car park. This was completed following discussions around where liability for maintenance stood.
- Members are reminded that two vacant seats remain on the Planning Committee. There is also one vacancy on the Finance Committee, one on the HR Committee and two on the joint Nomansland Management Committee.

Matters of Note (cont)

- Stage 2 of the Sandridge Parish Swift initiative is now underway with the date of 5 November in the diary for a public information evening. This will commence at 7pm with both Tim Hill of the Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust and Clive Fleming of Hertford Swifts in attendance. Members are encouraged to attend.
- The Committee for Sustainability will be discussing a move from hard copy agendas to electronic versions held on tablets at its meeting on 16 September.
- Herts County Council's Annual Meeting for Parish, Town & Community Councils and County Councillors will be held on 12 September either in person (Hatfield) or online. Please see the reminder emailed on 2 September for details.

COUNCILLOR AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Grant Applications

- Sustainable St Albans (St Albans District Fixers)
 Following discussion it was proposed by Cllr Leonard, seconded by Cllr Ternouth and resolved to award the sum of £750 towards the purchase of a PAT tester and training for one person.
- Quadrant Traders Committee
 Following discussion it was resolved not to award a grant towards the provision of Christmas lights/tree at The Quadrant at this time.

Lease of Community Space (Hall) on the Oaklands Development

The meeting was updated on discussions with Taylor Wimpey around the Parish Council taking a lease on a community building on the Oaklands Phase II development. It was unanimously resolved that, in principle, the Council is prepared to progress this matter subject to a number of provisions. Cllr Leonard to write to Taylor Wimpey confirming this. The Clerk and the Centres Manager to be included in future discussions.

Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging in Parish Council Car ParksCllr Chachulski updated Members on discussions held with an EV charging point provider. She undertook to follow up that meeting with the intention of establishing viability and cost.

Community Governance Review (Boundaries)

Cllr Ternouth presented a draft report and proposal in response to the District Council's CGR consultation. It was unanimously resolved to submit the report as circulated (with two minor amendments).

Installation of Heat Pumps for the Parish Office, Hall and Committee Room

Cllr Wells talked Members through a report detailing three quotes for the installation of air source pumps in the Parish Office, Committee Room and Community Hall. It was explained that the existing systems for heating/cooling these spaces are not environmentally sound, cost effective or efficient. Questions were asked and responded to, after which it was unanimously resolved to approve the installation and also the recommended contractor, this subject to approval for the release of funds by the Finance Committee at its meeting on 22 September.

S6 Bus Service

Members received a verbal report from Cllrs Ternouth, White and Chalkley on a follow-up meeting with Mr Robert Handbury of Herts County Council Network Planning regarding the S6 bus service. It is hoped there will be improvements to the service, particularly following the development of Oaklands Grange Stage II.

Sandridge Youth Sports and Community Association Cllr Hale updated the meeting on efforts to bring the Association onto a more stable footing.

Cllr Chalkley reminded Members that the new bus shelter on The Ridgeway, incorporating a living roof, local artwork and timber planters will be officially opened on 22 Sept between 1pm and 3pm.






